

ARTIST STATEMENT

I started painting 34 years ago. The urge to create has continued to push me to explore new media. My inspiration for representational work has always been the play of light, the changing seasons, and the reflections on water. The need to communicate through art led me to begin working abstractly -- using encaustic painting and later cold wax with oil paints, which is my main medium currently.

My intention is to express ideas and feelings without being representational. These abstract pieces are still inspired by nature and the play of light, but additional subject matter includes historical sources and my reflections on places and old civilizations. Change and loss thread their way into these paintings.

This series, A Walk in the Forest, is inspired by my long walks in our parks. Wandering through the trees is rejuvenating and calming. Being in the midst of trees in all seasons and watching the changes in color and texture inspires awe and wonder. I have tried to reflect these feelings in the work and hope that I have come close.

BIOGRAPHY

Sawsan Alhaddad was born and raised in Southern Iraq, among palm groves and marshes. She immigrated to the United States 43 years ago and worked in the medical field for 34 years.

She took up watercolor as a way to relieve stress in 1992, taking classes and workshops at the Cleveland Museum of Art, the Morgan Conservatory, the Orange Art Center, and others. She also traveled to other parts of the USA and abroad for workshops. After retiring from her career, she took up art full time. She now works mainly in oil and cold wax in an abstract style. She still dabbles in watercolor, oils, and pastels for her own enjoyment, depicting figures, plein air landscapes, and still-life subjects.

Bruno Casiano

ARTIST STATEMENT

Bruno Casiano is a Puerto Rican artist based in Cleveland, Ohio, who combines traditional and contemporary art. Born in Gary, Indiana, as the son of a steelworker, Bruno's family moved back to their hometown, Juana Diaz, a rural community in Puerto Rico, when he was 10 years old. Young Casiano developed an interest in art awakened by these rural surroundings and by the awareness of living on an Island, which made an impression on him. In his present work (regardless of the technique he chooses), from a traditional perspective, he emulates the look and feel of silkscreens, which are important in Puerto Rican tradition. In addition to that, imagery of mountains, mangos, ceiba trees, caves, leaves, branches, water, and colors and forms in high contrast are common themes in Casiano's work.

BIOGRAPHY

In Puerto Rico, Casiano studied painting at the School of Plastic Arts in Old San Juan in the early 1980s. He pursued further studies in illustration at The School of Design, Altos de Chavon in La Romana, Dominican Republic, and, in the mid-1990s, at the Cleveland Institute of Art in Ohio. For a few years, he owned and curated the Bruno Casiano Gallery on the West side of Cleveland. The Gallery eventually became unviable, but Bruno Casiano continues to know and be known by most artists in the area.

Yiyun Chen

ARTIST STATEMENT

My process for making works comes out of my daily practice of walking around and photographing unfamiliar places, such as in the streets of small towns and cities, parks, and the interiors of buildings. There is a repetition of motifs throughout most of my work, visualizing the contradiction between old memories and my current reality. This practice reminds me of my early experiences living in the States. Whenever I had days off from work, I would walk around the Chinatown area, looking at the street lamps, mailboxes, and old confusing posters that were stuck on the walls of the city. Sometimes I would sit in a parking lot or watch TV shows in the laundry. The practices of photographing and thinking are referenced in the concept of boredom as a function of attention, described in Susan Sontag's book 'As Consciousness Is Harnessed to Flesh: Journals and Notebooks, 1964–1980'. Sontag points out that "most of the interesting art of our time is boring." Finding something interesting and enjoying the playfulness in its boredom is my process of shooting. I was drawn to this concept of boredom and attention in photography, using it to create a romantic and poetic communication of my inner meditations -- visualizing the experience as a person navigating different cultures, social expectations, and realities. I realized that I was looking for a picture similar to my superimposition of past and present in the physical world, a conversation between my emotions and reality.

BIOGRAPHY

Yiyun Chen is a Cleveland-based artist whose photographic work and photobooks have been exhibited in Wausau MOCA, Zanesville Museum of Art, Ohio University, Indiana University Kokomo, Rochester Institute of Technology, Cleveland State University, Cleveland Institute of Art, Lakeland Community College, San Joaquin Delta College, Colorado Photographic Arts Center, Ann Arbor Art Center, Gallery 263 in Cambridge, PH21 gallery in Hungary, and Loosen Art Gallery in Italy. (Etc.) Chen's works could also be seen as part of the collections of the Cleveland Art Association, Mandel Foundation, Rochester Institute of Technology, and Cleveland State University.

Chen was born and raised in Guangdong, China, and made his move to the United States when he was 20. As part of a first generation of Chinese American immigrants, his first jobs landed him in Asian supermarkets and restaurants. When it came to those "off from work" days, he picked up a camera and started taking pictures to explore the areas outside of the Chinatown. After a few months of settling into the new country, Chen returned to school -first to complete his high school diploma. In 2015, he received his Bachelor of Arts in Studio Art from Cleveland State University. He was invited into the Post-Bachelor Program at the Cleveland Institute of Art, where he continued his studies in photography and video. In 2018, Chen earned his MFA in photography and related media from Rochester Institute of Technology, where he was also a recipient of the Theodore Chapman and William A. Reedy Endowment Scholarship in support of graduate studies.

ARTIST STATEMENT

After exploring various mediums, I settled on wood sculpture. Nature has been my inspiration. I gather impressions and store them in my memory bank to be later transformed into unique works of art. Recently, I have started to explore the challenging technique of wood bending as a process to create unique wall sculptures. To some of the shapes I have added handmade paper, paint, and embossed metal. I have found wood bending to be a creative and exciting technique.

Content is important and I strive to present a reimaged view of our surroundings. I am constantly trying to increase my artistic vocabulary by exploring my world through Fresh Eyes.

BIOGRAPHY

I am a "Life Long Learner." I am intrigued by the process of how something is created. At an early age, I started taking Saturday classes at the Copper School of Art, The Cleveland Museum of Art, and the Cleveland Institute of Art. After graduating from Bedford High School, I continued my studies at Bowling Green State University and went on for a Master's at Case Western Reserve and the Cleveland Institute of Art. I taught art for 8 years at Bedford High School, raised a family, and then decided to pursue my goal to create art. I have exhibited at the Ohio Governor's Residence, Butler Museum of American Art, Massillon Museum, Southern Ohio Museum, and the Cleveland May Show. I have completed many public sculptures. Some are located in Rockville, Md., Columbus, Ohio, Peoples Bank, Munster, In., and Hobe Sound, Florida. I continue to exhibit at local and national shows.

Donald Penn

ARTIST STATEMENT

Don Penn got eyes that see way more than you and me. With photographic antecedents like Gjon Mili, Harold Doc Edgerton, and even Eadweard Muybridge, Penn dives deep beyond the two or three dimensions that most of us accept as the domain of the medium of photography. By stretching his visual scope to include the third (and often the fourth) dimension of time, beyond that of space, the images he presents force us to embrace and think about a time/space Einsteinian universe that is a visual and mental challenge on a number of fronts. When we look at the work of Don Penn, with its many layers and dimensions and its incredibly lush palette, the interaction is never simple or straightforward. By showing us, for example, an image of the Japanese Butoh Dancer Minami Azu in action, in the space she occupies, or a man on the street in Havana with a glittering multi-dimensional car, or even when we see the many facets of the barn series in rich black and white, we are transported in ways that a "straight" photograph never could transport us. You won't want to rush through his works of photographs the way you would in a normal exhibition. You will be greatly rewarded for taking the time to savor the dimensional nuances of this remarkable body of work.

BIOGRAPHY

Don Penn's passion for photography has spanned many decades. After a very successful business career, he has reignited his love for photography. He studied with Dan Levin at Tri-C, and, through those classes, developed a multi-image technique. This technique shows many dimensions of the subject and incorporates the surrounding environment to provide the viewer a rich experience while observing the image. Don partakes in photo shoots in New York City, Cuba, and elsewhere, and his art has appeared in many local shows.
