ABOUT THE EXHIBITION

PRISMATIC is a collection of five artists, each working with a different but complementary medium, united by threads of color and abstraction. Hope Hickman's work investigates the mundane and the ironic, with particular attention to contemporary life within the American suburbs. Marianne Hite takes images of nature and animates them in her glass artwork. Sue Kirchner creates with Encaustic wax not only because it's an ancient medium, but because the pigmented layers themselves create a sense of time. Cherie Lesnick tries to capture the energy that surrounds us on paper, using color, line, and mark-making. Patricia Zinsmeister Parker paints based on personal experience as viewed through a lens of abstraction and representational genres.

Hope Hickman

ARTIST STATEMENT

Within Prismatic, Hope has included a handful of pieces encompassing her ceramic fabric, an integral medium to her practice of ceramics within the expanded field. Still a medium in progress, most of these pieces are an exploration of design and craft. Some incorporate elements from her larger practice.

BIOGRAPHY

Hope Hickman is a multimedia artist, originally born in Northeast Ohio. Her artistic training was received through informal mentorships in folk-art both in and around Asheville, N.C. Currently, Hope's work investigates the mundane and the ironic, with particular attention to contemporary life within the American suburbs. In addition to her paintings and sculpture, she is well known for her ceramic jewelry -- that of which recycles antiquated motifs in metalsmithing. The work is ironically made of dirt and toilet paper (ceramic with paper pulp for lightness) then coated in 22K gold and is part of a larger discussion examining value, desirability, and capitalism.

ARTIST STATEMENT

Working with glass has kept my interest over the years, especially once I began incorporating small drawings and photographic imagery into my work. This imagery allows me to express details I could not previously achieve within the medium. Through this technique, I can take images of nature and animate them in my artwork. Living in Northeast Ohio offers many fascinating scenes of the changing seasons. This spectrum allows me to gain inspiration throughout the year. During the winter months, I am able to spend time inside my studio without many distractions. While the outside world is cold and guiet, I become more in tune with myself and gather inspiration. In the summer, I observe the world come back to life and I honor the spirit of rejuvenation in my self-expressions. Introducing new materials into my creations often yields unexpected and fascinating results, which is a thrill of being a glass artist. My figurative pieces range from maguettes to lifesize figures, and the hallmark of my work is the use of enameling techniques which I have carried into my glass work through the use of gold or silver foil and silver wire. When light is emitted or reflected through glass, it lends a certain quality to the piece that nothing else can duplicate. Moreover, the effects of heat, timing, and gravity ensure each piece its own identity. I find experimenting with such a distinct and elusive medium invigorating. Dabbling with intriguing materials sparks my interest and imagination, which keeps me motivated. I love making art because I can connect directly with others in a visual manner, and I hope my work evokes the same inspiration I feel while I am creating it.

BIOGRAPHY

Marianne Hite, a native of Akron, Ohio, was born in 1962. She started as an enamellist on metal, but upon seeing the cover of a magazine with Dominick Labino's glasswork, she searched for a place to study glass as well as enameling. While attending Kent State University, she was exposed to glass artists not only from America but from all over Europe as well. The glass program was under the direction of Professor Henry Halem. He was instrumental in providing the opportunity for the student's exposure to a very rich and diverse array of world-class talent. Marianne Hite received her B.F.A. from Kent State University in 1987. Since then she has operated her studio in the City of Green. Her expressive style employs a variety of techniques such as glass fusing, enameling, sandblasting, laminating glass, mosaic, and stained glass. She teaches small classes in her home studio and also teaches in Peninsula, Ohio.

Sue Kirchner

ARTIST STATEMENT

I was attracted to Encaustic not only because it is an ancient media, one of the first used by artists wishing to preserve their work for another day, but because this medium (created with layers upon layers of pigmented wax, each one fused to the one before it), gives, by its very nature, a sense of time. The fact that those layers often peek out from behind each other draws me right into the work every time. I have also been experimenting with encaustic mono-type, working with wax on a hotbox and mounting my prints onto cradled boards. And, because of the freedom it provides, I am now working with cold wax and oil paint as well as hot. Using this process I am able to create larger pieces. My work is intuitive and abstract and it often inadvertently refers to the landscape I grew up with on the East Coast.

BIOGRAPHY

I was born in Connecticut and lived there and in Massachusetts until I married and moved to Cleveland in 1969. I went to school in New Canaan, CT., then high school in Tyngsboro, MA., and later graduated from Emmanuel College in Boston with a BA in Art and education. I have been married to my husband Bernie for 55 years and we have 3 grown children and 7 grandchildren. I have been committed to making art for over 40 years, first as a watercolorist and now as a wax artist. My studio is located in the schoolhouse building in Little Italy. I have shown my work in Ohio, Boston, Colorado, and Florida, and am represented here in Cleveland by Stillpoint Gallery.

ARTIST STATEMENT

This past summer my visiting grandson spent a great deal of time capturing (and releasing) the lightning bugs that proliferated our back yard at dusk, drawn to their magnificent sparking (and sparkling) energy. In a similar way I am drawn to the energy that surrounds us and is in ALL things and I try to capture that energy on paper, using color and line and mark making. I abstract what can be seen (or imagined) in my search for what is unseen - but felt and understood. If you see or feel energy in my painting, I have been successful.

BIOGRAPHY

A degree in theatre (BFA, Wayne State University, Detroit) and a degree in psychology (MA, WSU, Detroit) proved to be stepping stones to my true passion - art! While never closing the door to either of these precursors, I instead found everything I had learned and experienced to be so much a part of my creative process when I entered The Center for Creative Studies (Detroit) as a freshman and graduated 4 years later with honors. The once-a-year senior show for CCS is a part of Detroit's cultural community and is highly anticipated and heavily attended. I had 43 paintings in this show and sold out completely in the first 45 minutes. This helped to confirm I was on the right path. Since graduating I have had successful gallery representation in Michigan, North Carolina, Alabama, and now in Cleveland Heights (where we moved in 2015). While living in Cleveland I have had 5 solo exhibitions, have been in a number of juried shows, and not only have sold numerous paintings but have also been honored with various awards. It is a joy to be a part of the artistic/cultural community here. My daughter likes to refer to me as the Grandma Moses of abstract watercolors and I rather like that idea. ARTIST STATEMENT

As a 12-year-old, growing up in Cleveland, I was granted a 4-year scholarship to The Cleveland Institute of Art on a Gifted Children's Program. It was the start of a lifetime of creating art, studying art, and teaching art. My exhibition record is extensive: beginning in The Cleveland Museum's May Show and, 14 years later, ending with The Best in Show award in 1982. In the 85-year history of the May Show, only 5 WOMEN received Best in Show in the painting category! My exhibition venues have been in Cleveland, Ohio, Akron, China, New York, Chicago, and Washington, D.C. My career remains active with several exhibitions scheduled for 2024.
